
The Lanz Bulldog tractor has thump, thumped back into life after those with the knowledge required to restore old machinery succeeded with this project.

Selected entries from Charlotte Couchman's diary (thanks to Diane Vincent for enabling readers to share in the journey aboard the Arethusa to New Zealand in 1879). Extracts will be shared until Charlotte arrives in New Zealand, as there have been requests for more from her diary.

Thursday 25th September Another night passed in safety and all well. Thank God. We are now 4,000 miles from England nearing Cape Verde Islands. We are only halfway to the Cape of Good Hope and then we shall be halfway to New Zealand.

We see such lots of flying fish they are like herrings with wings – they come out of the water in shoals and fly along a distance and then dive down and fly out again like swallows. Dear Sisters and Brothers I hope you will all see my diary and read it and say my sister wrote this to us when she was on the sea on her 50th birthday. What a foolish old woman to go from England but I don't wish myself back again yet.

What is a Dead Horse in nautical terms?
Obsolete term used by seamen to describe
the period of work on board ship for which
they had been paid in advance when signing
their articles. Having worked off the 'Dead
Horse' the crew celebrated by parading
around the decks an effigy of a horse stuffed
with straw.

A traditional ceremony that marked when a ship's crew paid off their debt to the ship. The ceremony involved hoisting a horse up to the yardarm, singing a sea shanty, and then dropping the horse into the sea. 'flogging a dead horse' = futile effort. Explanations thanks to 'Google'

We have had fine fun this evening. The sailors have been riding the *Dead Horse* round the deck by moonlight – the procession passed round with their tins and drums three times and then drew him up to the yard arm and set him on fire.

At the same time a lighted tar barrel was thrown over and we could see them burning from miles away. The meaning of it is this. When the ship sailed from London Docks the sailors drew a month's pay in advance, so they have been working off a Dead Horse all this month. Now they have made away with the 'Dead Horse' and are going on afresh.

Well, this is Saturday.27^{th.}I am sorry to say we are becalmed 300 miles from any land. We expect to cross the line tomorrow then I hope we shall catch the trade winds and get along better. This evening, we have had a grand concert on the main deck - 24 men all dressed like niggers with black faces came forward first singing a song they have composed themselves about the brave 'Arethusa' and her crew. They were encouraged to sing it again and then came several good songs and recitations Acting the barbershop was a laughable farce. Well, it all helped to pass the time away – it was kept up until 10 o'clock.



Celebrating 100 years of the Caterpillar Tractors in 2025.

This photo shows part of the New Zealand Caterpillar Experience, Rotorua. Lindsay Willis opened this exhibition in 2006 but it closed in 2013. The collection is now in Wanaka. Gough, Gough and Hamer became NZ dealers in 1932 and in 1937, 38 & 39 they topped world sales. Sold to a Malaysian company in 2019 for \$211 million dollars (unsure whether NZ or US dollars.)
